### A LETTER FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

Wow. Just. Wow. Martin Facey's Workshop was a knockout. The man is a lavaspewing volcano of creativity and insight who shared inventive (and sometimes bizarre techniques), a seasoned view of artmaking and his belligerent view of galleries and sales.

His teaching and techniques emphasized transcending thinking in favor of listening to our hearts. He pushed us to follow our impulses, take risks and be willing to fail. He encouraged us to have at least ten pieces going at the same time. One exercise that was particularly weird and fun was playing with rusty wire, nails, sediment and even stinky bamboo leaves that he'd been "pickling" in a rust bath for god knows how long. We "artfully" spread these items on wet sheets of paper which we stacked and pressed overnight. The next day we used the imprinted sheets to make more art.





Guggenheim, Museo Rein Sofia, the Venice Birennale,) taught at colleges and universities, and lectured all over North America and Europe – you can understand why CAA is so excited about his presiding over our show, May 3 – 23 at the Betsy Lueke Arts & Creative Center in Burbank.

# GENERAL MEETING, FRIDAY MARCH 22 GUEST SPEAKER: MARY SHERWOOD

Mary Sherwood is a painter and master printmaker who recently retired as adjunct professor from Loyola University. In 2014, as part of her interest in the history of printmaking in Los Angeles, she curated "The Press is my Paintbrush" featuring John Greco of Josephine Press and Francesco Siqueiros of El Nopal Press.

The artist came of age during the post-modern period where mashups, like those in collage, were a typical sensibility. Common themes in her work are feminism and extinction which beget strong mythlike tales. She draws much of her imagery from scientific illustration, medieval, and romantic art, such as the double helix of maternally inherited mitochondrial DNA, and the dodo bird.

Her favorite process is intaglio printing, and she had to be convinced that she uses collage. But some of her pieces involve cut printed paper attached to the main print with "archival double stick" sheets from Blick. They work like peelable double-sided tape. The closest product match seems to be Grafix Double Tack Mounting Film.





She pointed out that culture in societies doesn't develop until women show up.

"My work has been an investigation into the disjointed connection we have with the natural world, especially in light of scientific research that has yet to be properly processed culturally. Over the years, these themes have become allegories, too."

Mary exhibited a few works on paper. The top two are from her myth-based series, The Well. Other print series in her slide presentation included Splendid Fruit, Talented Ladies, and Heads. A major group of paintings was Fables of Extinction, featuring extinct birds which were symbols of the overlooked status of animals by humans.



Hyperion was a wall installation of many dinnerware plates. Prints were mounted and protected behind glass dishes rather than the more typical glass sheet. Mary Sherwood's print was then framed in a circular design which she painted on the back of the plate.

## OUR NEXT GENERAL MEETING, FRIDAY MAY 17 GUEST SPEAKER: KATHI FLOOD




Kathi Flood's wallworks, installations, and assemblages offer colorful narratives about contemporary urban life. A self-declared 'guerrilla sociologist', her tongue-in-cheek observations are expressed through her visual art, writings, and activism.

Flood uses etchings, drawings, fibers, text, and gutterwalk findings on antique supports to tell humorous, sentimental, goofy stories that catalogue our responses to urban life. She categorizes and comments on local issues such as traffic patterns, over-development, qualities that define a city, and the architecture of Los Angeles.
